



Mobile Outreach Street Health (MOSH)

Harm Reduction in Practice: Making Street

Health a Priority



In the August 2010 edition of the NSHEN Newsletter, Marika Warren described the Harm Reduction approach to health care, in particular its application to work with people engaging in high risk behaviours such as injection drug use or sex work. On a local level, the principles of harm reduction guide the work done by the staff of Mobile Outreach Street Health (MOSH), a relatively new program in Halifax-Dartmouth based out the North End Community Health Centre, supported by Capital Health and other partners.

MOSH offers outreach primary health care delivery, (nursing and occupational therapy with medical back-up), to individuals who are homeless, in shelters, or marginally housed, or whose lives are in chaos due to addictions, street life, or mental health issues. Many of the clients are seen in collaboration with agencies that also practise harm reduction, such as Mainline Needle Exchange. MOSH works with people in the moment, or over time, slowly establishing relationships of trust that enable change. A favourite story is that of Annie, (not her real name), who had been using IV opioids for many years and was developing new abscesses almost weekly. Although she saw her family physician regularly for management of her COPD, she hid the secret of her addiction from him. MOSH followed her for wound care, listening to her troubles, and talking up alternatives to her IV drug use. After more than a year of encouragement, Annie began methadone maintenance at Direction 180, (another harm reduction program), and her commitment continues!

MOSH was developed to provide health care to people whose needs were unable to be met by the regular health system, which is designed for the average person who can keep appointments, take their meds correctly, and deal with hospital routines. Many MOSH clients have experienced judgement, discrimination, and rejection when they've tried to access health care in hospital, at clinics and family practice offices, or at home. Their circumstances can be disconcerting, leading to fear and disapproval on the part of some health care providers. More important, when clients are deemed to be intimidating or undeserving, care can be denied or withdrawn.

MOSH endeavours to meet people where they are in life, conveying concern and respect, and accepting challenging situations. The team is finding that collaborating with other care providers while working with clients in common, is broadening the providers' understanding of clients' situations, and is helping to reduce barriers to care. The values of dignity, justice, equity, and fairness, reflected in the codes of ethics of most health professions, should inspire all who work in health care to recognize that they can be part of creative, safe solutions in ensuring better care for vulnerable, underserved people.
