## Medical Scribes

### White Coat, Black Art w/ Dr Bryan Goldman (podcast)

#### Summary<sup>1</sup>

In this episode of White Coat, Black Art, Dr. Bryan Goldman looks into the pros and cons of using medical scribes in the Emergency Department (ED). At the Queensway Carlton Hospital in Ottawa, Dr. Peter Graves runs a company known as Medical Scribes of Canada. The company currently employs 20 scribes in Canada. In 2015, Queensway Carlton Hospital ran a pilot project to determine the effects of using scribes in the ED. The scribes follow the doctor and are responsible for medical record keeping during the medical consultation. The pilot project showed that 82% of doctors who used scribes were able to see more patients per hour. Moreover, a 13% increase in efficiency was reported, but according to Dr. Graves, efficiency has been seen to increase up to 20% as doctors get more used to using the scribes.
