

## Fireside Chat Video Series Discussion Questions

## **Ethics Issues in Indigenous Health**

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The following discussion questions are provided as an additional educational tool to accompany this fireside chat video. Please feel free to select the questions that are most relevant to your committee or group, and to revise and adapt them as needed. As always, we welcome feedback on this or any other NSHEN resource.

## Questions:

- According to Dr. Bombay there is little reliable data available for Indigenous groups in Canada. What might be the reason for this?
- Explore different ways to ensure that health research meets the needs and concerns of Indigenous communities.
- Several health indicators, including rates of chronic disease and mental health problems, demonstrate significant inequities in health outcomes for Indigenous people in Canada. How can research contribute to addressing some of these inequities?
- Dr. Bombay states that different aspects of colonialism continue to make it difficult for Indigenous communities in Canada to find ways to address the various determinants of health that continue to affect these communities. What might some of these systemic barriers be?
- How might health care education systems contribute to fostering cultural competence and culturally safe health care?
- Dr. Bombay mentions that not asking a person's cultural background can be perceived as not being
  attentive to the whole person. Discuss how this may influence individual health outcomes, and consider
  different ways to approach all patients in a culturally safe way.
- Many of the issues Dr. Bombay discusses are linked to of systemic discrimination; how can health care contribute to addressing this legacy of colonialism?
