## Summary<sup>1</sup>

This documentary follows Dr. Shelly Sarwal, a physician from Halifax, during the last few months of her life. Dr. Sarwal, diagnosed with multiple system atrophy, received medical assistance in dying (MAiD) shortly after it was legalized in Canada in 2016. Her last project was to donate her organs after receiving MAiD. She dedicated the last days of her life to educating health care professionals and the general public about organ donation as a way to create a meaningful legacy of one's life, as well as contributing to public discussion about MAiD.
